As VP, Occupational Health & Safety in the Global Support Organization for Ahold Delhaize, she pursued global initiatives to ensure safe workplaces and promote health around the world. In this role, Libby developed and deployed Ahold Delhaize's first global safety strategy and vision, which established safety committees and performance indicators to track progress and results. Yielding favorable results of decreased injury rates and lost time injuries for most local brands, Libby's efforts help to increase associates' risk awareness, interest in safety activities, and understanding of the financial and personal impacts of injuries.

As VP, Risk Management & Safety for Retail Business Services, her current role, Libby is responsible for ensuring a safe workplace and shopping environment for associates and customers of Ahold Delhaize USA's great local brands. She also oversees robust business continuity planning, workers compensation and liability claims and litigation management, and property protection. Further, Libby supported merger integration work to pull four separate functions into a unified US Risk Management function, which now sits within the Legal organization in Retail Business Services. Leading a 135-person department, Libby works closely with Ahold Delhaize USA leaders to create and implement strategies to reduce risk and costs of risk.

Through her professional progression, Libby has gained indispensable insight on leadership and career development.

If you're looking for growth and development, see how you can influence and make recommendations for change or improvements within in your current role," said Libby.
